

# **Stability**

An often-unconsidered importance for hobbyist growers is that of physical plant and root stability. Many of the orchids found in home collections are naturally epiphytes, spending their entire lives attached to other plants. They have no need for traditional soil and will use the host plant as an anchor without being parasitic or harming it along the way. Orchid roots attach themselves with tiny microfilaments that are very fragile and easily torn. These micro roots are very important to the health of the plant, in addition to adhesion, in terms of water and nutrient intake and even photosynthesis.

In the case of home cultivation, we have to do our best to mimic their natural environment. In Southeastern North Carolina not many orchids can grow on trees that are outside year-round. We often use bark, sphagnum, cork, tree fern, coconut fiber, or branches as host media for the roots to adhere to as they would in nature. No matter the media, the roots must be stable in order for orchids to truly prosper.

For potted orchids, there are special pins that can be purchased that will clip onto the pot after sliding through the media and snugging the roots gently until they are stabilized. Some plants may need more than one. Before I started using clips on my potted orchids, I always feared repotting them because there seemed to be an inevitable setback and root loss. Stabilizing with pins has made a huge difference. I don't mind repotting anymore because I don't have those issues.

Mounted orchids and their aerial roots want stability too. If they are living in nature, they will prosper once fully attached and positioned in an opportunistic spot. I have seen attachments to mounts with monofilament, string, twist-ties, staples, and even pantyhose. Any material that offers stable attachment to the mount without damaging the micro roots or reacting with the plant should do the job.

Taking the time to consider the stability of your specimens will surely increase your growing success.





# Magical Lighting Exhibition Illuminates NC State University Arboretum



RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA – For seven nights in November, the magical lighting exhibition *Moonlight in the Garden* will illuminate and showcase JC Raulston Arboretum at North Carolina State University.

Sold out every evening in 2018 and 2019 and on hiatus for the past two years, *Moonlight in the Garden* provides the only opportunity to access and experience the JC Raulston Arboretum after dark.

"Moonlight in the Garden is a chance for us to light up the garden and share what a magical place the Arboretum can be at night," said Mark Weathington, director of the JC Raulston Arboretum. "The

lighting displays and the artistic uses of light show how different a garden looks and what can be done to make it an enchanting space into the night."

Exhibition dates include a special Preview Night, with finger food and beverages, on Tuesday, November 8, 6:30-9:00 PM; plus, presentations on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, November 10-12 and 17-19, with timed entries between 5:30 and 9:30 PM. A limited number of tickets are available; click here to order.

"Together with the colorful and festive lighting exhibition, *Moonlight in the Garden* is a time to bundle up, welcome the fall season, dine at the best food trucks, enjoy the live music, have some hot cider, and roast marshmallows over the fire pits," said Weathington.



Moonlight in the Garden is a favorite for families looking for a multigenerational family-friendly event that brings together people of all ages to enjoy an evening in the garden. New this year will be the lighting of several dramatic stone sculptures by local artist Phil Hathcock and a series of Chinese lanterns in Asian Valley.

Advance tickets are \$20 for members of the Arboretum, \$30 for nonmembers, and \$5 for children under 12. All ticket sales are limited – online reservations are recommended. *Moonlight in the Garden* is sponsored by the North Carolina Agricultural Foundation and custom designed and installed by Southern Lights of Raleigh.
