## AOS Awarded Plants: What do all those <u>letters mean?</u> APRIL TOBIASSEN SAAS

American Orchid Society Representative

The American Orchid Society has an awards program that recognizes outstanding examples of orchids. When a particular plant shows desirable qualities, it can be submitted to a group of certified judges to be graded in hopes of an AOS award. These judges are experienced growers and have additionally had at least 7 years of practice and study in a program of AOS accreditation. An accredited judge must then maintain 12 hours of yearly continuing education and a minimum of 8 judgings per year. They put in significant time to master skills from a specified core curriculum to identify superior quality.

AOS awards represent a measure of quality recognized worldwide. These awards are income increasing for commercial growers, certifying desirable traits, and justifying a higher price. For hobbyists, the awards are prestigious. The record for the most awards, at over 800, belongs to Robert Fuchs.

In order to be considered for an award, the scientific name of your plant or the name of the cross must be known. There is no fee to have your plant judged. If it receives an award, a fee is charged to cover administrative expenses.

Plants are assessed on a 100-point scale. There are 3 levels of awards given for Flower Quality. A Highly Commended Certificate (HCC/AOS) signifies a score of 75 to 79. An Award of Merit (AM/AOS) indicates a score of 80 to 89. A First-Class Certificate (FCC/AOS) brings a top score of 90 to 100. The flower must meet established cultural criteria upon assessment. Judges will look at the form, color of flower, size of flower, substance, texture, stem arrangement, and arrangement of blooms. Color vibrancy, splash petals, spots, and lip structures are also considered.

There are 2 levels of awards given to exhibitors. The plant must have been in the care of the exhibitor for at least 12 months. To be considered, it must be robust and well flowered according to established standards. In this category, a Certificate of Cultural Merit (CCM) signifies a score of 80 to 89 and a Certificate of Cultural Excellence (CCE) a score of 90 to 100.

Additionally, there are various grower specific awards that help to identify excellence and assure strong future breeding. Annually, awards are also given to the top acknowledged comparable specimens from various categories.

If the specific plant that receives the award has not been awarded before, it can be given a chosen clonal name (specific to that plant) in addition to its known scientific name. The specimen can then be easily identified for future interactions and uses. An individual plant can be awarded more than once but can only be given one clonal name.

### **INTRODUCING OUR OCTOBER SPEAKER**

Our October 12<sup>th</sup> speaker, Brenda Oviatt, from Botanic Ltd will be speaking on *Angraecoids: Conservation & Culture.* 

Botanica Ltd. is owned and operated by Bill Nerison (architect) and Brenda Oviatt (graphic artist). They began growing orchids in 1983 and over time their growing has evolved from a hobby into a two-part business. One half of the business involves growing and selling orchids (primarily species) to other interested growers. The other half of the business is focused on the ex-situ propagation of endangered angraecoids and the education of hobbyists and growers concerned with the plight of many species of plants and animals from Africa and Madagascar.
